Quick discussion of approaches

- Git is a tool that supports collaboration. Multiple people can work on the same file and access it and share their changes. Git also keeps track of all the old versions of your code.
- Eclipse is an IDE for programming in Java- enter code, play with syntax, compile, run, debug, refactor, etc.
- Git and Eclipse can play together using EGit.
- They can also play together if you use command-line git
 - (and then you'll have easier access to various git tools)
- An alternative approach, using command-line Git
 - Use command-line git to commit, download, upload, compare, ...
 - Use Eclipse to edit code
 - Connecting the two: The New Project wizard lets you specify a directory, so just use one created with command-line git

Things you should figure out how to do ...

- Collaborate using the same repository
- Undo changes
- Deal with conflicts
